## Views From the Town Chair

As the spring newsletter is winging its way to you, so have the Sandhill cranes been winging their way back to our Town. The return of the Sandhill cranes is always a hopeful sign of spring. Of course, spring brings not only the return of the Sandhill cranes, but also the return of seasonal severe weather. As we know all too well, the Town is no stranger to severe weather.

While there's not much we can do to prevent severe weather from impacting the Town, we do have the means to mitigate potential catastrophes. The Town of Dunn is committed to keeping our residents safe. Residents of Bayview Mobile Home Park are most especially vulnerable to severe weather. The Mobile Home Park has been narrowly missed by two tornadoes in the last two decades. Recognizing the need for a storm shelter for that population, we set to work.

After much hard work and many setbacks, we have received a FEMA grant that will allow us to construct a storm shelter to protect residents, should severe weather strike. This shelter will protect over 500 people from loss of life and injury during severe

## Burying Ground Plant Identification Eagle Project

In an effort to identify several varieties of the remnant prairie plants, Life Scout Sam Richards, is creating a sign for the Town of Dunn Burying Ground. Early records mention shooting stars, pussy toes and trillium blooming in this early prairie cemetery. The original section of the burying ground which was purchased in 1852 (the Northwest corner), has been under scrutiny as of late for the Town's "no mow" policy. This practice has been instituted out of respect for those buried there, with the original landscape in mind.

The effort to return the burying ground to its original appearance (pre-lawn mower days) has enabled the diminishing wildflowers to flourish. Mowing after the seed heads have formed, in early fall, has aided in the propagation of these vanishing beauties.

This year, in addition to following its "no mow" practice, the town will also be moving the flag pole (Boy Scout Mike Walters' Eagle project of 1998) to the newer addition of the burying ground.

Richards has researched the property records, interviewed town residents and photographed the delicate plant life. In working with the townsfolk, he has learned much about the Town's history. And as a steward of the town, he is pleased to play a role in the preservation of this history.

Please join him in celebrating the dedication of this sign at this year's Arbor Day Celebration, April 25th at the Dunn Town Hall.

## Tornado Shelter

(cont. from page 1) Statistics from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Storm Prediction Center for the period from 1985-2002 show that 49% of the tornado fatalities in the United States are suffered by those who remain within or attempt to flee mobile homes. A FEMA document entitled "Are You Ready" warns people in a vehicle, trailer, or mobile home to "get out immediately and go to the lowest floor of a sturdy, nearby building or a storm shelter. Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes." Unfortunately, residents of Bayview Mobile Home Park are isolated in a rural area and do not have access to nearby shelter.

A major weather event could result in loss of life, personal injury, homelessness, and property damage if the Mobile Home Park was affected. With an estimated 577 residents, the park represents 11% of the population of the Town of Dunn. The potential effects to this population would be devastating for the entire community and is preventable with adequate shelter.

FEMA announced this March that the Town had been awarded the requested grant funds to construct a storm shelter, which will be located in the Bayview Mobile Home Park where it is most easily accessible to residents. The shelter will be 3,360 sq. ft and is designed to withstand winds up to 250 mph. The project is set to be completed by November 2009.

## The Town Considers Change to its Burning Ordinance

The Town Board is considering a change to its burning ordinance to require permits and provide set-back, chimney, and burning material regulations for outdoor wood burning furnaces. The current burning ordinance and the proposed change are posted on the town's website at [www.town.dunn.wi.us](http://www.town.dunn.wi.us) and are available at the Town Hall.

The following is an excerpt from Wisconsin Department of Health Services website:

### What is an Outdoor Wood Boiler?

An outdoor wood boiler (OWB) is any furnace, stove, or boiler designed to burn wood to heat a residence. The basic design of the OWB encourages a slow, cooler fire, to maximize the amount of heat transferred from the fire to the water. Slow, cooler fires, however, burn inefficiently and create more smoke and creosote than higher temperature fires. The most efficient wood-burning furnaces burn at very high temperatures, include a heat store of several hundred gallons of water, and have refractory tunnels where high-temperature secondary combustion can take place. These units are typically installed inside the home, have very low emissions, and have a stack height of 20-30 feet. Outdoor models often are missing these important features.

### Smoke associated with OWBs

At the relatively low temperatures at which OWBs are designed to burn wood, the stoves can produce thick smoke and creosote. This smoke can contain unhealthy levels of toxic air pollutants and known carcinogens, including significant amounts of particulate matter (PM) of various polycyclic aromatic compounds (PAHs).

### Hazards associated with burning garbage or inappropriate materials

Burning particleboard, treated, stained, painted, wet or freshly cut wood can release very toxic chemicals. These materials should never be burned in OWBs. Trash burning is especially harmful because it releases chemicals that are persistent in the environment, polluting our air, food, lakes and streams. Burning plastic and treated wood also releases heavy metals and toxic chemicals such as dioxins. Exposure to dioxins can cause skin problems, reproductive or developmental problems, and may even increase the risk of cancer.

### Existing Public Health Laws and Ordinances

Several communities in Wisconsin have taken the step of creating ordinances that ban or regulate the use of OWBs. The adoption of local ordinances regulating outdoor wood stoves is currently the best way to address the issue proactively.

## LAND TRUST COMMISSION UPDATE

In the past year, the Land Trust Commission focused on its long term planning, worked on a couple of Development Rights purchases, said goodbye to one Land Use Manager, and welcomed another.

The Commissioners were proud to be a part of the work on an easement on the land owned by the Madison Retriever Club on the southern shore of Hook Lake. By placing a conservation easement on this lovely property, we have added to the preserved area around this unique lake. The deal was completed in mid-March.

During the interim period between the departure of Renee Lauber and the coming of our new Land Use Manager, Erica Schmitz, the Land Trust Commission had excellent support from acting Land Use Manager, Ben Kollenbroich. Ben, in turn, had expert advice and help in PDR negotiations from our friends at the Natural Heritage Land Trust, Jim Welsh and Kate Wipperman.

In January, the Land Trust Commission began working with the new Land Use Manager, Erica Schmitz. Erica has already helped us complete our long term planning process and has begun a review of all our PDR applications.

By the time this newsletter is published, Town of Dunn landowners should have received letters from the Land Trust Commission inviting them to consider applying to the PDR program, or if they already have applied, to confirm their interest in the program. The letter also mentions the new federal tax incentives for donating development rights.


The Town of Dunn Purchase of Development Rights program is now 12 years old! We have preserved over 2,800 acres of farmland thus far and are looking forward to continuing to protect agriculture and open space in our town.

### NOXIOUS WEED NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes 66.0407 that every person is required by law to destroy all noxious weeds on lands in the Town of Dunn which the person owns occupies or controls before the plants bloom. Noxious weeds include: Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge and Field Bindweed (creeping Jenny).

## Prevent Snow Damage to Your Mailbox



In Wisconsin snow removal operations frequently conflict with mailboxes. Mailbox installations that have been successful in reducing the number of mailboxes damaged or demolished by snow removal feature a 24 to 36 inch "arm" at a 46 inch height. This allows the snow plow to remove snow closer to the mailbox and maintain a greater distance from the post.

Mailbox installations do require regular maintenance and must withstand the weight of wet snow being pushed on them by a snow plow. After several years of freezing and thawing, mailboxes may need to be re-installed. The Town does not pay for or replace mailboxes that collapse due to snow removal efforts.

## Do your Part to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle

### Curbside Recycling

Dunn residents have several ways to recycle material. Common recyclables such as household plastics, glass, aluminum, aerosol and tin cans, cardboard and newspaper are picked up by Waste Management in the weekly trash and recycling pickups each Wednesday.

Because wet paper products may not be recycled, withhold cardboard, newspaper and other paper recyclables for later pick-up if it is raining on Wednesday morning, or if the forecast indicates rain is likely.

**Plastics** - Numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 plastics are now recyclable! Rinse and remove caps and rings; labels can remain. Flatten as much as possible. Bottles that have contained motor oil, medicine or chemicals cannot be accepted for recycling. All #2 plastic one and five gallon buckets can not be recycled.

**Aluminum** - Only aluminum cans are accepted for recycling.

Rinsing is encouraged. Don't include any other kinds of aluminum such as foil or aluminum pie plates in the recycling bin.

**Tin Cans** - Food cans only - no paint or chemical cans. Rinse, remove labels, and flatten. Please put sharp lids in the trash.

**Aerosol Cans** - can be recycled! Make sure they are empty and remove plastic nozzles.

**Glass** - Jars and bottles are accepted for recycling. Always rinse and remove the lid. Labels can remain on the container. Light bulbs, dishes, drinking glasses, mirrors and window glass can be recycled elsewhere or disposed of as trash.

**Newspaper** - Newsprint must be dry and bundled. Shiny inserts are acceptable. Place in brown paper bags. Do not mix with other types of paper!

**Magazines** - Magazines and catalogs must be in bundles and tied with string in 6 inch stacks. Do not mix with other types of paper!

**Mixed Paper** - Junk Mail, Office Paper, Soft drink/Beer cartons can be recycled. Place in brown paper bag. Do not mix with newspapers or magazines!

**Cardboard** - Corrugated cardboard can be recycled. Flatten boxes and keep dry. Cut pieces into less than 3 foot squares and bundle with string or place in a grocery bag. Pizza boxes, egg containers and wax-coated boxes can not be recycled.

### Waste Management Curbside Pick-up

Each household is allowed one 34-gallon container for solid waste and an unlimited volume of recyclables. The charge is included on your tax bill each year.

For additional volume pick up contact Waste Management. For a fee they will provide an extra 64-gallon toter or an extra 96-gallon toter. These toters may be filled in addition to the usual 34 gallon container allowed. Cost is billed directly to the homeowner. At the time of this publication the cost of the 64-gallon toter was \$66.00 per year and the 96-gallon toter was \$84.00 per year.

Items that are too big to fit into a 34-gallon receptacle such as mattresses, chairs, couches, etc., can be arranged to be picked up by calling (608) 273-2500 at a cost of \$25.00 per item. These items are picked up on Fridays. Appliances such as washers, dryers, refrigerators, etc. can also be scheduled for pickup at the cost of \$25.00 per item by calling (608) 273-2500. These items are picked up on the 4th Friday of every month. Waste Management can also help you with your remodeling needs or clean-up. Please call (608) 273-2500 on the cost of renting a dumpster.



### Town of Dunn Transfer Site

4030 County Road B, 1/4 mile east of the Dunn Town Hall

Open all year on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays of every month from 8 AM to 4 PM. The transfer site will be open seasonally from April 8 - October for additional hours every Wednesday from 2 PM - 4:45 PM.

The Transfer Site accepts:

- Scrap Metal
- Motor Oil
- Yard Waste
- Brush and Wood
- Batteries
- Tires

**Transfer Site Recycling Scrap metal** - Scrap iron, steel, copper, and other metals are accepted. We don't accept compressors or motors.

**Motor oil** - Used motor oil that is free of other liquids such as antifreeze is accepted. Either reuse your used motor oil container or dispose of it in the trash. Don't leave oil containers near the used oil tank.

**Leaves and grass clippings** - Put any compostable material in the compost pile at the Transfer Site, or compost them yourself at home.

**Brush and Wood** - We take brush and limbs that are free of soil. We cannot take stumps or painted lumber. Dane County's landfill will take tree stumps.

**Tires** - We charge \$3 for auto tires \$4 for tires with rims. Tires (rims removed) can be taken to the Dane County Landfill for about 85 cents each.

### DANE COUNTY COMPOST SITES OPEN MID-APRIL

Yard wastes are banned from disposal at all landfills in the State of Wisconsin. Dane County will open its three yard waste compost sites in mid-April. All sites are available for people to bring non-woody yard waste to be composted. The Verona site will have finished compost available for pick up. Unscreened compost is free for the general public. Screened compost is available at the Westport location only.

**VERONA SITE HOURS:** Monday - Saturday 8:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Located adjacent to the old landfill at Badger Prairie Park (Take USH 18-151 toward Verona. Exit Business District and turn right to Badger Prairie Health Care Center/Badger Prairie Park parking lot. Turn right at compost sign and follow gravel road to site).

The compost sites accept only non-woody plant material. They do not accept brush, Christmas wreaths or garlands (because of the metal wire), or trash of any sort (such as pieces of fences, plastic bags, Styrofoam, plastic lawn edging, or similar material). # 2009 RECYCLING GUIDE



## Home Composting

*Composting is a great way to keep organic material out of the waste stream. It saves tax dollars and provides you with a valuable soil additive. Composting is easy to do if you follow a few simple guidelines.*

1. Use a bin. A simple wire enclosure will do. A bin keeps your pile neat and helps retain heat and moisture, two key elements of the compost process.
2. The key to a good working compost pile is a balance of green materials, such as grass clippings or food waste that is high in nitrogen and brown material, such as leaves that are high in carbon. A good rule of thumb is to maintain a 50-50 ratio by weight of green and brown material.
3. If you are going to compost kitchen waste, bury the material 6-12 inches below the surface. This keeps flies away from your pile. Compost only vegetable and fruit waste. Do not compost meat, fats, gravy or pet waste.
4. Don't forget moisture. A compost pile should be damp so be sure to add water to dry material as you build your pile. Don't over water. Materials should be as damp as a wrung out sponge.

### Building a Compost Pile

**First layer:** 3"-4" of chopped brush or other coarse material on top of the soil surface allows air circulation around the base of the heap.

**Second layer:** 3"-6" of green material, grass clippings, or food waste.

**Third layer:** 4"-8" of "brown" material, such as leaves. Add water as needed.

**Fourth layer:** 1" of soil serves as an inoculate by adding microorganisms to the pile.

**Fifth layer:** Repeat steps 2-4 until the bin is almost full. Top off the heap with a layer of leaves or straw and scoop out a "basin" at the top to catch rainwater.

### Maintaining Your Compost Pile

A properly made compost pile will reach temperatures of 140-160 degrees F in four or five days. At this time you'll notice the pile "settling," a good sign that your pile is composting properly. After 4 or 5 weeks, turn the pile, putting material from the outside of the pile into the center of the new pile. Add water if necessary. You shouldn't need to turn your heap a second time. Your compost should be ready in 3 to 4 months.

## One Day Only - Extra Curbside Garbage Pick-up April 22nd

**Planning on cleaning out the garage or basement this spring?  
Wondering how to get rid of large items?**

Waste Management is offering extra curbside garbage collection on Wednesday, April 22nd. On regular garbage pick up days, each residence can put out 34 gallons of trash plus unlimited recycleables for curbside pick up. On April 22nd, residents can put out extra garbage at no additional charge. There are some restrictions. ## On the Road Again...

Due to the cold and snowy weather residents will find numerous pot holes this spring as the road thaws. In addition to the pot holes there are many large dips at culverts caused by road swelling from the freezing water in the soil. Around the culverts gravel is placed during installation which does not retain the water and therefore does not expand like the soil on either side of it. They should smooth out as the frost leaves the ground.

going back to the small stones. We will try to give the residents some advance notice but it will probably happen in June sometime depending on their schedule and the weather.

We will be replacing culverts in various areas of the town. Culverts on Halverson Road, two on Lake Kegonsa Road, and two on Waucheeta Trail.

Just a reminder to residents that road right of way is 33 feet from the center of the road. This area is used by the town for road maintenance, snow removal, and water drainage. It is also important to prevent shaded areas from holding moisture deteriorating blacktop surface. It is sometimes necessary to remove whole trees instead of just trimming. In addition, remember our parking ordinance states that there is parking on road sides but all the tires have to be completely off the road. Especially during snow removal.

The 2009 roadwork bids are out, we will be repaving Waucheeta Trail, Mc Connell Street and Gannon Street. Seal coating will be done on Brooklyn Drive, S. Brooklyn Drive, Lynch Circle, Giehler Road, Duncan Road, Aalseth Lane, Bjoin Drive, Rutland Dunn Townline Road, and Lake View Terrace, Woodland Terrace. We used a product last year called slag which was not as excessive and smaller when finished. The residents did not like this product so we are

We are storing the seed waiting to plant it.

It is greatly appreciated when residents take care of the parks they use. However, we have three major problem areas in Town Parks:

- 1) The first problem occurs at Spartan Hills. There have been problems with motorized vehicles in this park. There are to be no motorized vehicles of any kind in any parks. This means no dirt bikes and no snowmobiles.
- 2) Pet waste is a problem in several parks. Please clean up after your pet. If you are going to take your dog in the park, you must keep your dog on a leash and clean up its waste! If this problem does not improve, we will have to consider a "no dogs in the park" rule so that people can walk and kids can play in these areas. This dog-waste problem also exists at Amundson boat landing.
- 3) Remember Town Parks require you to carryout your own litter. The Town does not provide trash removal at parks. There have been significant problems with litter at Amundson, Spartan Hills, and Rock Elm. Let's keep our parks clean for all to enjoy.

If you are interested in helping to beautify the roadsides in Dunn, the town would like to encourage people to sign up for the Adopt a Highway program. If you don't like to see the roadsides littered with trash, get a group of friends together and sign up to clean up! The town provides garbage bags and orange vests for participants. ### **Tree Board Update**

The Town of Dunn has been awarded a DNR Urban Forestry Grant for 2009. This grant will help The Town of Dunn Tree Board continue to make strides in the promotion and management of our urban forest. Our tree ordinance is in place and we continue to review the objectives for the urban forestry plan and will be working to achieve these goals.

We are continuing to maintain the four foundational standards of "Tree City USA" by maintaining a Tree Board, following a Tree Care Ordinance, developing a community Forestry Program, and celebrating an Arbor Day Observance and Proclamation. Members of the Tree Board will be available at this year's Arbor Day Celebration to answer your arboreal questions and provide you with educational materials. We invite you to attend this event on Saturday, April 25th at 4 PM at the Town Hall. Patrick Ready, recipient of the 2007 Audubon Society Award will present a power point presentation on Dane County birds and back yard habitat and Sam Richards will present his cemetery project for his Eagle Scout award.

## Town of Dunn Burying Ground

The Town of Dunn Burying Ground was established in 1852, although the land had been used as a burial ground by the Beebe family before they sold it to the Town. In the late 19th century, the Burying Ground became the final resting place for several Civil War Veterans and by 1890, the half-acre cemetery was deemed full and no further burials were permitted.



Nearly a century later, the Town acted to restore the Burying Ground, conduct a historical study of the individuals buried there, and develop guidelines for its continued preservation and maintenance. Work was completed by a cemetery task force that included Marion Berman, Jackie Jeardeau, Loraine Hawkinson, Margaret Lalor, Lottie Halvorson, Ann Taylor, Pam Crapp and was Chaired by Jo Reynolds. The Wisconsin State Old Cemetery Society and Sand Hill Veterans Association contributed to the restoration of the grave markers and grounds. Despite setbacks, including an act of vandalism on Halloween of 1985, restoration work on the burying ground continued. In 1986, a flagpole was erected by a local Boy Scout as part of his Eagle Scout Project and the re-dedication of the Town of Dunn Burying Ground along with the dedication of the Veterans Memorial Plaque took place the following Memorial Day.

The Madison Landmarks Commission and the Dane County Cultural Affairs Commission honored the Town of Dunn in 1990 with an award recognizing the Town's restoration of the historic Burying Ground.

Throughout its history, the burying ground has been left largely in its natural state. Early records mention the large oak trees and lilac bushes that still exist today. Pink roses along the eastern fence line, mock orange and wildflowers including shooting stars, pussy toes, and trillium complete the picture of an early prairie cemetery. In this original state, field stones and wooden crosses marked many of the gravesites, along with the surviving marble headstones.

Please visit the Town of Dunn Burying Ground and enjoy the beauty and peace of this restored site. If you look closely, you may find the mock orange, shooting star, pussy toe, and trillium blossoms that adorned the Burying Ground when the Beebe family began burying their loved ones here. In order to maintain the historical beauty of the Burying Ground, the Town mows selectively, only twice per year. This allows the native prairie wildflowers to flourish as they did throughout the early history of the Burying Ground. Please take pleasure in the tranquility of the Burying Ground much as it appeared nearly two centuries ago.

### **All-Hazard Warning Radios (Weather Radios) Will be Available at the Town Hall**

The Town of Dunn will partner with Dane County Emergency Management to distribute all-hazards warning radios (a/k/a weather radio) to the public.

About the radio: The radio proposed is the Radio Shack model 12-262 Desktop Weather Radio with the following features:

- Programmable – Specific Area Message Encoding (SAME) allows the user to program the radio to alert for only the desired location and warning types.
- Battery backup – the radio will still work if power is lost.
- Visual display of warning information
- Relay to activate external devices like a bed shaker or strobe light for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- Includes a jack for an external antenna if needed to improve reception
- Alerts by voice announcement or tone.

**This radio retails for \$60 but it is available through this program at \$25 plus tax.**

**We will be limited to sell no more than two radios per household.**  
We expect to have radios available at the Town Hall by April 1, 2009.

### **Do You Need a Permit?**

If you are: altering an existing building, constructing a new building, doing major repairs, adding a solar collector, adding a bay or bow window, cleaning out drainage ditches or ponds, doing any brush or tree cutting, filling or grading in a floodzone, wetland or shoreland area, you probably do need a zoning permit. For information call: **Dane County Zoning 266-4266.**
